Fair Regulations

Hall Exhibits:

- Membership fee will NOT be charged to exhibitors 14 years and under.
- Membership fee, \$5.00, is a once per year fee required for all entrants (Nov 1st, 2025- Oct 31st, 2026) please see exemptions where noted.
- Entry forms and tags are to be completed prior to exhibit drop-off on Friday Sept 11th, 2026, at the Delisle Community Centre in Delisle between 5:00pm-7:30pm.
- All exhibits are to be registered, with entry fee paid, on or before Friday evening.
- Exhibits will only be awarded a prize if deemed worthy by the judge (unless otherwise specified).
- Prize money will be awarded Saturday between 4:00pm-5:00pm.
- Maximum one entry per article per person (any age).
- Prizes: 1st place \$5.00, 2nd place \$3.00, 3rd place \$2.00 (unless otherwise stated in class information).
- Entry Fee \$.50 per exhibit (unless otherwise noted).
- Exhibit removal will ONLY be allowed between 4:00pm-5:00pm on Saturday September 12th.

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Roots, Vegetables and Fruits

Tips for Exhibiting

Beets – 2-3" in diameter. Top trimmed to $\frac{3}{4}$ " above crown. Rubbed clean, not washed or scrubbed. Root may be trimmed to 1" approximately.

Cabbage – Heads should be solid, free from insect damage and cracks and not stripped.

Carrots & Parsnips – tops removed approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ " above the crown. Tap roots should be left on.

Cauliflower – Leaves should be cut off level with the top of head. The curd should be white and compact. Remove small leaves.

Corn – Should be uniform in size and shown in the husk.

Onions – Trim tops 1-2" above bulb – well dried, firm, well matched. Only jagged and dirty outer scales should be removed, not peeled. The roots should be removed just below the bulb. (green onions exempt).

Potatoes – Tubers should be true to variety. Brushed clean, no skin damage in cleaning. Free from greening as well as disease, insect and mechanical damage. Should be smooth, shallow-eyed, uniform size. Should be one cultivar. Size most desirable for table stock is 6-9ounces (180g). Tubers weighing less are acceptable but must be uniform and not less than 2" in diameter.

Rhubarb – Stalks uniform. The leaf blade should be trimmed to leave about one inch in a fan shape. The stalk is left intact as pulled from plant except any loose tissue at base should be trimmed.

Tomatoes – The specimen should be true to type, ripe, well matched, firm and free of cracks. Calyx not to be removed.

Turnips – Top and root should be trimmed off without leaving large scars.

Zucchini – Should be 12" or under.
